CEO STAN LITTLE SITS DOWN WITH ZIPPO CEO GEORGE DUKE

n 1936, my great-grandfather started a cotton yarn company in our hometown of Humboldt, Tennessee in the middle of the Great Depression. Five generations later, it's one of the largest employers in that small town of 8000 people. When I learned that the Zippo Lighter Company had a similar origin in our Southern Airways community of Bradford, Pennsylvania, I knew I had to meet its CEO and learn more about a local, family company with roots similar to my own. CEO George Duke and I sat down together for an hour this summer to chat.

Stan Little: George, it's great to meet you. I wish we were in person, but in Covid-times, we'll have to settle for Zoom. I would guess that most folks in the western world know about Zippo lighters. It was your grandfather who invented the Zippo, right?

George Duke: Nice to meet you, too, Stan. Yes, it was my grandfather, George Blaisdell, who started Zippo here in Bradford in 1932. It was a very small company during the Depression, but we really got "put on the map" during WWII. In fact, during the War, the public couldn't even buy a Zippo lighter—they all went to the troops. My granddad actually became friends with General Eisenhower and with Ernie Pyle because we were supplying the Army with so many lighters overseas.

SL: And was it an immediate success?

GD: No—Before the War, the company struggled for many years. In fact, there were a couple of times when my grandfather wasn't able to make payroll. But his employees stuck with him through the tough times, and when things got better, he decided to repay their loyalty by declaring that no Zippo lighter would ever be manufactured anywhere but Bradford, Pennsylvania. In 2022, we will have kept that promise for 90 years!

SL: Smoking was still very popular back then—and even through the 1980's. I remember getting my first Zippo lighter when I went off to college in 1990. Now that most Americans have quit smoking, has that hurt sales at your company?

GD: Not at all. Would you believe that most buyers of Zippo lighters today are collectors? And, you mentioned earlier that Zippo is known "throughout the western world." Our biggest markets now are actually in Asia, with China and Japan leading our growth. We'll make more lighters this year here in Bradford than at any point in our history—over 13 million, in fact.

SL: That's truly incredible, George. You know, one of the most identifiable things, to me, about a Zippo lighter is the sound it makes when you open and close the top. It's just unmistakable. Have you had copycats who've tried to profit off your success?

GD: Oh, absolutely. Many, many times. And especially in China. We're one of the few companies in America that's been able to successfully trademark a sound with the U.S. Patent & Trademark Office. The Zippo sound is truly unique—and it's legally ours! Harley Davidson tried to trademark the sound of their motorcycles, and they couldn't do it. But we saw their attempt and wanted to do it ourselves—and we did it!

SL: So how do you know when someone is being a copy-cat? The world is a big place...

GD: Zippo distributors worldwide are our eyes and ears looking out for copycats, and we aggressively go after companies who attempt to steal the Zippo design and sound.

SL: I hope you're able to take them to court right there in Bradford!

SL: In your mind, what does Zippo mean to Bradford and what does Bradford mean to Zippo?

GD: You know, we've been here so long, and we rarely publicize what we do in the community. It's just a great relationship. We wouldn't be around today if it weren't for those folks here in Bradford who stuck with my grandfather in the 1930's, and I hope we've paid that back to this city over the past 90 years.

Stan Little: It sure sounds like you have, George. It's been a real pleasure spending time with you, and I look forward to seeing you in person the next time I'm back in Bradford, PA. I hope Southern's new service to Washington-Dulles will be useful to your team when they're headed to China and Japan!




5 Clara Barton National Historic Site

he Chinatown Historic District is a neighborhood located in Honolulu, Hawaii. Established in the 1800s, it is one of the oldest Chinatowns in the United States. Originally, this area is where immigrant Chinese families began to establish family-owned businesses. In the mid-1800s an influx of contract laborers came to Hawaii to work on the sugar plantations, the majority of them signing 5-year work contracts. Once these contracts expired many of the Chinese immigrants moved to Honolulu's Chinatown in search of work or the opportunity to open their own businesses. Today, Chinatown has maintained its heritage while maturing into a thriving multicultural hub that features a diverse selection of ethnic restaurants, shopping, and a growing art scene.

Sample Diverse Cultures through Dining

Chinatown has several award-winning restaurants for you to choose from. Stroll the neighborhood and you will come across restaurants offering ramen, pizza, guava-covered lamb chops and so much more. Whether you're looking for an ethnic dining experience or a sampling of ethnic street food, you will find a taste bud pleasing encounter.

Experiencing Nightlife

Soak up the Art Scene





TAGOVAILOA:

WHERE HE CAME FROM AND WHERE HIS SIGHTS ARE SET

"Tua" Tagovailoa (TUNG-oh-vy-LOW-uh) has become one of the NFL's most talked-about quarterbacks coming into his second season; however, being in the spotlight is something the Miami Dolphin's quarterback is used to.

Tua was born to Galu and Diane Tagovailoa in 1998 in 'Ewa Beach, O'ahu in Hawaii. His parents acknowledge Tua's intense passion for football started from a young age, remarking that as a small child he would often sleep with a football under his arm. While playing with the Pop Warner youth football program, Tua was said to be able to throw a ball 30 yards while his peers would throw an average of 10 yards. This all to the delight of his childhood inspiration, Seu Tagovailoa, his grandfather who was so respected in the Samoan community he was often referred to as "Chief". The two were said to be so close that Tua almost quit football when Seu passed away, but, Galu helped him see that playing would honor his grandfather more than guitting would.

Tua attended High School at Saint Louis School in Honolulu. Mentored by fellow Hawaiian native, former St. Louis Alum, Heisman Trophy winner and current NFL quarterback, Marcus Mariota, Tua flourished. In his senior year Tua threw for 2,669 yards and 27 touchdowns. He played in the All-American Bowl and became a part of the Elite 11 roster

Tua's rise to the national eye came in the form of a scholarship offer to play with college football powerhouse, the Alabama Crimson Tide. In his freshman year, Tua found himself backing up future NFL quarterback, Jalen Hurts. Under the watchful training of Alabama Head Coach Nick Saban, Tua once again thrived hitting the spotlight when he was brought in after halftime to replace Hurts who was struggling in the National Championship game. Tua threw a touchdown pass in overtime that lifted the Crimson Tide 26-23 over the Bulldogs. He was honored as the CFP National Championship's Offensive MVP.

Despite a devastating injury during his junior year, Tua's career at Alabama was impressive enough to garner the attention of many NFL teams. During his 3 years playing with the Crimson Tide, he had a 69% completion rating and threw for 87 touchdowns with only 11 interceptions. He rushed for an additional 9 more touchdowns on the ground.

Tua's hip injury during his junior year had an impact on his draft stock. Originally, a projected #1 overall draft pick, he fell to the 5th overall pick by the Miami Dolphins. His rookie year didn't quite meet the expectations most had for him; however, his record lends hope to his full potential. For a successful sophomore year, Tua will need to grow more comfortable and confident in his ability and team. The Miami Dolphins recognize this and have brought on two receivers, one of which Tua has played with while playing for the Crimson Tide, Jaylen Waddle, in addition to numerous other draftees and free





agents. The familiarity of Waddle as well as these additional players should bring the confidence he needs to ramp up downfield throws to successfully lead his team.

The talent of football runs deep in the Tagovailoa family. Tua's younger brother, Taulia is following in his big brother's footsteps by transferring to the Maryland Terrapins in 2020 after backing up his brother while playing for the

Alabama Crimson Tide. The dual-threat guarterbacks will continue to bring honor to their family and fellow native Hawaiians through their football legacies and futures. We will watch with great hope and anticipation for the 2021 NFL season as Tua takes the next step to establish himself as a top-tier NFL guarterback.


History

Chadron began in 1885 as three separate railroads were built running through this area en route to Wyoming. It expanded beyond a few wooden shacks, a couple of dirt roads and its reputation for fur-trading to become the economic leader in the Nebraska Panhandle that it is today.

Attractions

Museum of Fur Trade | The museum stands on the site of the original James Bordeaux's post that was established in 1837 as the American Fur Company. It houses over 6,000 artifacts that display what life was like in early America for fur traders and Native Americans in the West.

Chadron Public Library | Listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1990, this library is a historic Carnegie Library. Funded by a \$5,000 Carnegie grant, it was built in 1913 by arhictect George A. Berlinghof for for just \$100. Wander the grounds to appreciate the Neoclassical architecture and go inside to enjoy an afternoon of book browsing.



Nebraska National Forest | This National Forest is open year-round and includes various places to go hiking, biking, horseback riding, camping and even hunting. It is split into 2 districts: The Bessey Ranger District (90,000-acres) and the Pine Ridge Ranger District (52,000-acres). Each offering their own unique experiences.

Take a Ski Day Trip





RIDING THE IMPERIAL SAND DUNES OF CALIFORNIA

he largest mass of sand dunes in all of California, the Imperial Sand Dunes are located in the southeastern corner of the state. Extending more than 40 miles, the Dunes height often reaches peaks of 300 feet above the desert floor. An amazing place for off-road enthusiasts who crave adventure, outstanding scenery and adrenaline rushes. An equally amazing place for the novice looking to sample out the popular desert sports and riding equipment. The North Algodones Dunes Wilderness area of the dunes provides a more laid-back experience than the main dunes. This area of the dunes, totaling almost 26,000 acres, is off-limits to vehicular traffic due to the California Desert Protection Act.

Glamis ATV Rentals

Glamis ATV Rentals is a popular ATV rental company in the Imperial Dunes area. Whether you are a seasoned rider or brand new, they ensure you feel comfortable with the vehicle rented, understand safety measures, know the dos and don'ts of riding as well as all the rules and regulations of the trails. All rentals include helmets, goggles and gloves.

Guided Tours

Glamis ATV Rentals offers amazing tours of the dunes for those who don't want to venture out on their own. The half-day guided tours start at \$195 per person and full days start at \$295 per person. Lunch and drinks are included on the tours, please make them aware of any allergies you may have.

ATV Rentals

Rent various name-brand ATVs from Suzukis to Yamahas to go out and explore the dunes on your own. Grab a map of the various terrains to trek: Sand dunes, sand bowls, sand mountains and large open areas. Rentals start at \$200 a day for the base ATVs. ho says Halloween time can't be a little creepy and a little educational? We have compiled a list of the top places in Providence, Rhode Island with some historical depth and maybe even a few ghostly secrets, the question is: Do you dare to explore them?

Providence City Hall

Built in 1878 by architect Samuel J.F. Thayer, Providence City Hall is rich in history. Even being the site where Presidents Teddy Roosevelt and John F. Kennedy had once given speeches on these very steps. It is said by City Hall workers that "something" rides the elevator at haphazard times, moves chairs around, open drawers and whispers throughout the building. You can personally tour Providence City Hall to see if you encounter any paranormal activities for yourself.

Rhode Island School of Design

Since 1877, the Rhode Island School of Design opened with the intent to help women access design education. It has since been the home of many famous alumni including Claire Daines and Seth MacFarlane. Multiple buildings on campus are said to be haunted. With claims of apparition's reflections being displayed in mirrors, unknown

footsteps down halls and lights flickering on their own, this is definitely one of Rhode Islands creepiest sites to explore.

Crescent Park Looff Carousel | This hand-carved carousel

was built in 1895 by Charles I. D. Looff at his Brooklyn, New York factory. It is now located in Crescent Park in the Riverside section of East Providence. It is said that the spirits of those who perished in a major nearby fire in the 1960s haunts the ride by turning the music on at random, flashing the lights and employees have even reported seeing nearby apparitions of a woman in a hoop skirt.

America's Most Haunted Hotel

The Biltmore Hotel

Said to be one of the most haunted hotels in all of Rhode Island, the Biltmore was named America's Most Haunted hotel in all of the United States in the year 2000. It opened in 1922 and currently houses 292 rooms. It has been featured in numerous movies and has influenced writers such as Stephen King and Robert Bloch to gain inspiration for terrifying fictional accommodations such as the Overlook Hotel and the Bates Motel. With a deep history of trecherous occurrences and historical events, the hotel has long been associated with a powerful connection to darkness. Guests and employees often report the sounds of rowdy partiers pouring out from empty rooms during all hours of the night, dancers dancing across the hotel ballroom floor and of course, some ghostly wanderers.

FULL OF HISTORY AND GHOSTS

ust a few short minutes down the road from Hanscom sits the historic location of Concord, MA. The site of the first U battles of the Revolutionary War. Home to such influential poets and novelists like Ralph Waldo Emerson, Henry David Thoreau and many more. Concord isn't just full of history, it also has a long history of ghostly activity.



Haunted Tour of Concord

Coming from Hanscom, your first stop on a haunted tour of Concord is the Old North Bridge. Step out into the parking lot by the Old North Bridge and you will see the Robbins House. By day it is a wonderful memorial depicting the history of Concord's African American community. By night there are stories of misty figures roaming the property, but that is only the start. Cross the street and you will come to a walkway leading to the Old North Bridge. Ghosts of America's early struggles for independence have been seen crossing the bridge, while other stories tell of seeing shadowy figures, perhaps those of the British Soldiers and provincials who died at the start of the Battles of Lexington and Concord.

Minute Man National Park

Further venturing into history we come to Minute Man National Park. The park not only houses relics from the Revolutionary War but it is the site for the Wayside Home of Authors and more recently it is frequented by paranormal investigation groups. Ghost hunting is not limited to adults. The park even offers a Halloween Lantern Walk through the roads to meet the spirits of 1775.

Sleepy Hollow Cemetery

The next stop on the haunted tour of Concord is to a cemetery. It isn't hard to imagine a cemetery being creepy but with a name like Sleepy Hollow, how could it not be haunted? Sleepy Hollow Cemetery is the final resting place for many famous and notable people. Author's Ridge alone is where you can find the graves of Emerson, Thoreau, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Louisa May Alcott, William Ellery Channing, and some of the most frequent haunted happenings. Misty figures, moving shadows, and faint voices have all been reported on the grounds of this early American cemetery.

Colonial Inn: One of the Most Haunted Inns

The last stop is certainly the best bet for those ghost hunters. Welcome to the Colonial Inn. Built in 1716, this iconic inn has a history of frequent ghost sightings dating back to a young honeymooning couple who reported seeing a ghost in their room back in 1966. Since then, the Ghost in Room 24 has been a major draw for those looking for a spooky adventure. The popularity of potential ghost sightings has grown so much that Concord is a regular stop for ghost tours from as far away as Boston. Concord: Special and Spook Concord has so much to offer visitors. For many Concord has everything you picture as being part of New England. The historical significance, guaint town setting, and now haunted happenings all go into making Concord special and spooky.





HOT SPRINGS

Take a step back in time in historic Hot Springs. Lodging in Hot Springs




